The *British Journal of Nursing (BJN)* welcomes unsolicited articles on various nursing care issues. The journal publishes literature reviews, care studies and original research. All articles submitted to *BJN* are subject to double-blind peer review. The journal is indexed on: The International Nursing Index, PubMed and CINAHL. Please ensure all articles submitted are directly relevant to nurses and all claims made are backed up with appropriate referencing. Articles should be approximately 3000 words, although this can be exceeded in special cases when agreed in advance with the Editor. All articles should be submitted online at <http://www.britishjournalofnursing.com/contribute.shtml>. Articles should be double-spaced, pages should be numbered, all tables and figures should be included and numbered. Author identification should only appear on the title page. ## Title page

The title page should carry: title of article; names of the authors (with first names); institutional affiliation of each author; full details of each author's current appointment; name and address and contact details (including email address) of the author responsible for correspondence.

## Abstract

An abstract of between 100 and 150 words must be submitted giving a brief outline of the content of the article, including major findings.

## Key phrases

You must supply four to six full sentences that adequately summarize the major themes of your article.

## Conflict of interest

Authors must declare any conflict of interest. This is any possible interest, financial or otherwise, which may embarrass the author or the journal if highlighted at a later date. If you feel this applies to you, please provide a statement to run at the end of the article.

## Illustrative figures

Please provide diagrams, figures, photographs or slides (in colour). The best articles have one diagram, photo, drawing per 600 words to keep reader interest and show difficult to understand concepts. We can redraw any rough diagrams and charts. Authors must gain the necessary permission to reproduce figures/tables/artwork from other journals or books BEFORE submitting their manuscripts.

## Tables

Provide each table separately; clearly typed out. Be sure all tables are cited in the text, e.g. see Table 1. Place references and explanatory matter within a table in footnotes, not in the heading. Explain all abbreviations in these footnotes. Authors must obtain permission to reproduce data from another published or unpublished source.

## Abbreviations and units

Abbreviations must be defined at first mention.

## References

*BJN* uses the Harvard system of referencing. Other referencing will not be accepted. References should be the newest available for your needs, unless it is a noted historical reference.

### In the text

- Use the name(s) and year (Harvard) system for references in the text:
  - As Black and White (2005) have shown...
  - As already reported (Black and White, 2005)
- For three or more authors, print the first author's name then add et al:
  - As Black et al (2004) have shown...
- When several references are cited, the order in the text should be chronological.

### In the reference list

- List references alphabetically.
- Print the names and initials of works with six or fewer authors, e.g.:  
Black B, White W, Green GR, Red R, Tan T (2004)  
For seven or more authors print the first three then add 'et al':  
Black B, White W, Green GR et al (2003)...
- The format/layout for a standard journal article is:
  - Author(s) (year) Article title. *Journal* (abbreviated as in Index Medicus). **Volume**(Issue number): first and last page numbers  
For example:
    - Ballard K, Baxter H (2000) Developments in wound care. *Br J Nurs* 9(7): 405–12
- The sequence, layout and punctuation for books are:
  - Dealey C (1998) *The Care of Wounds* 2nd edn. Blackwell, Oxford
  - Ferrell B, Coyle N, eds (2001) *Textbook of Palliative Nursing*. Oxford University Press, Oxford: 418–45If chapter in book:
  - Woods SL (2004) Atherosclerosis. In: Woods SL, Motzer SA, eds. *Cardiac Nursing*. 5th edn. Lippincott, Philadelphia: 91–125
- Websites: In text, cite as for articles. In reference list as:
